


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# Everlasting Gospel Bible Studies Lesson 4 MANKIND'S HELPLESS DILEMMA

Many people sense that our planet is hurtling toward self-destruction and we are powerless to intervene. Unfortunately, few identify the pivotal cause of this dilemma: sin. Arnold Toynbee identifies the universal problem: "I am convinced, myself, that man's fundamental problem is his egocentricity [selfishness and sin]" (quoted by Karl Menninger in *Whatever Became of Sin?*, 227). What else could cause such violent crimes as we are witnessing in our world today? The world is experiencing skyrocketing increases in the size of its prison population and the cost of incarcerations. In the United States alone the following statistics apply:



The crimes include murder, forcible rape, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, larceny-theft, motor-vehicle-theft..

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### A. THE ORIGIN OF SIN

### 1. What is the biblical definition of sin? 1 John 3:4

**NOTE**: The Greek of this text is often translated "sin is lawlessness," implying that sin goes beyond the act of transgression to include an attitude or condition. It has always been, and will always be possible to disobey God. But the audacity to do so, the rebellious heart is our condition; it is our legacy from Adam. As the Christian matures, he will see that the rebellious heart itself is sin, a breaking of the commandment to love God with all our heart and soul and mind (Matthew 22:37), and that an overt act of sin against another human is only the inevitable consequence of this attitude. God knows our hearts, and even our most secret thought may thus be a sin.

2. Where, and with whom, did this sin problem originate? Isaiah 14:12-15; Ezekiel 28:14-18

**NOTE**: In many cases in the Old Testament, names had a specific meaning. As people matured, character was distinctly evidenced by the name. Before Satan fell, his name Lucifer meant light-bearer or brilliant one. After his fall he could no longer retain this name because of the change in his character. Therefore he was given other names as indicated in Scripture.

**NOTE**: In an earlier lesson, we learned that obedience to God comes from the heart. Romans 6:17. Because obedience to God and obedience to Satan cannot come from the same source (James 3:10-12), only a heart [mind] that has been transformed by Jesus will be able to render acceptable obedience. Romans 12:1-2

# C. PUNISHMENT OF SIN

12. Because a loving God does not leave us in ignorance, what does He warn is the result of sin? Romans 6:23

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13. Is it sin to be tempted? James 1:15; Hebrews 4:15

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**NOTE**: God carefully discriminates between the natural desires he has given us and the consequences of their abuse or overindulgence. James tells us here that when we allow lust (for food, mono, power, etc.) to govern us, it conceives (leads us to sin); and it is the sin which conceives death in us.

14. What ultimately becomes of the wicked? Malachi 4:1

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**NOTE**: Having revealed to us the origin, history, present reality, and future demise of sin, our all-loving God has provided for us the perfect solution. In His infinite mercy He has prepared a way of

salvation for us.

15. How helpless are our own efforts to overcome our own sin?

John 15:5

16. To what extent has God, through Christ, provided power to overcome sin in our lives? Hebrews 7:25; Philippians 2:12-13; Jude 24

17. If the sinner departs from his wicked course, what will God do for him? Isaiah 55:7

**NOTE**: as the repentant sinner embraces the saving power of the everlasting gospel in the fear of God, he will receive pardon and mercy.

18. Where should we look to find a remedy for sin? Hebrews 12:2; Titus 2:13

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19. Through whom can we find victory? 1 Corinthians 15:57; 1 John 5:4
